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# Cinema is never innocent

### Pablo Larraín

The third day of the 30th International Film Festival of Kerala came alive with urgency and reflection as Chilean filmmaker Pablo Larraín led a Masterclass that challenged how films are made, watched and remembered. Held at Nila Theatre, the session unfolded as a sharp, intellectually charged dialogue on cinema's moral weight, artistic responsibility and the courage to resist comfort.

A prominent voice in international cinema, Larraín, whose notable works include Jackie, Spencer, El Conde and No, the first Chilean film to be nominated for the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film, spoke with rare candour about failure as a teacher. His early missteps taught him that characters must be protected, loved and seen through a clear perspective. Characters, he said, are mirrors through which the audience recognises itself. Confuse that mirror, and empathy collapses.

Larraín challenged the comfort of formula. He rejected cinema that humiliates its protagonists only to redeem them later, calling such structures dishonest and intellectually lazy. Equally striking was his view on learning cinema. Film schools, he said, can guide but cannot teach the essence of filmmaking. That comes from reading history, philosophy and literature, watching films relentlessly, and learning through the act of making. Technique can be taught. Sensibility cannot.

Politics, Larraín insisted, is unavoidable. Every film, even the most intimate or entertaining, presents a vision of society and is therefore political.

Larraín views cinema as a powerful illusion. His masterclass left little room for complacency. It challenged filmmakers to be precise with perspective, honest with politics and fearless in complexity, reaffirming that cinema's true strength lies not in pleasing audiences, but in trusting them. •



Anuparna Roy's Songs of Forgotten Trees, winner of the Orizzonti Award at the Venice Film Festival, makes a quiet yet lasting impression at IFFK with its restrained storytelling and emotional precision. Set within the intimate confines of a Mumbai apartment, the film observes lives that exist in close proximity but remain profoundly disconnected.

The narrative centres on two

women sharing a domestic

space — Thooya, an aspiring actress, and Swetha, a corporate professional who sublets a room to her. Their relationship unfolds in silences, glances, and unspoken tensions, blurring the line between observation and intrusion. Roy's Mumbai is not a city of spectacle but one of emotional isolation, where physical closeness offers no guarantee of connection. The apartment becomes a symbolic enclosure, with doorways, frames,

characters' guarded inner lives. The film's measured pace and static compositions allow emotions to surface gradually, without dramatic emphasis. Thooya's performative encounters and Swetha's emotionally vacant relationships reflect different responses to the same loneliness, bound together by an uneasy coexistence. The absence of overt commentary gives the film its quiet strength.

# The Fault Lies with the Entire System Open Forum

The second session of the Open Forum, held at Tagore theatre premises on the third day of the 30th IFFK, saw a proactive discussion on the topic 'Patriarchy in Indian Cinema: Power, Gender and Politics'. The session unfolded less as a debate and more as a collective reckoning with fatigue, an exhaustion born not of momentary injustice but of sustained resistance. While the subject itself is familiar, what emerged strongly from the session was how deeply patriarchy is lived, endured and negotiated within cinema, especially by women who continue to create despite being constantly pushed to the margins.

Filmmaker Mini I.G spoke of power not as an abstract idea but as something embedded in everyday decisions:

who gets to direct, who is advised to step aside, and whose labour is quietly reassigned. She highlighted how films made by women, including her own, often dismissed as "kitchen stories" or family-centric, are rooted in lived experience, shaped as much by the films she could not watch or make due to domestic expectations as by those she did. This constant negotiation, Dr. Anu Pappachan noted, comes at a steep cost. When women must keep fighting for basic rights and legitimacy, creativity itself becomes difficult to sustain. Cinema. she argued, has historically remained aligned with patriarchal structures, where even success is unevenlu framed: a woman-led film becomes a collective achievement, while male-led successes are singularly heroic.

Bhagyalakshmi's long view of the industry echoed this weariness. While acknowledging shifts over time, she pointed to how power today is manufactured and protected by fan cultures, media narratives and superstar tags. Her striking observation that women in leadership often become "another kind of dubbing artist" captured the illusion of authority without real agency.

Critics G.P. Ramachandran and Dr. Rekha Raj widened the lens, reminding the audience that cinema is never merely entertainment but a site where social hierarchies are rehearsed and legitimised. The session was moderated by

# Stories Must Be Bold, Honest, and Accessible Meet the Director



The Meet the Director session on the third day of the 30th International Film Festival of Kerala offered an intimate window into the creative minds behind some of this year's most compelling films, moderated by Balu Kiriyath at the Tagore Theatre premises.

Nipin Narayanan spoke about Kathiruppu, a psychological thriller built around two characters in one night, a bold experiment in cinematic limitation. Arun Varghese followed, describing his psychological dramedy, a story of two sisters and childhood ties that premiered at the festival. Adithya Baby, wearing both director and actor hats for *Ambrosia*, called it an absurd fantasy set in a fine-dining kitchen, a film made possible with solid financial backing and a team that believed in its offbeat pulse.

Tannishtha Chatterjee, whose Full Plate premiered at Busan, spoke with refreshing clarity about her creative intentions. She described her conscious choice to marry accessibility with nuance: using mainstream cinema's energy rhythms and deep character work to let joy breathe even in darkness. For her, art house films need not be bound to sorrow; humour, she said, is rooted in life itself. When

pressed on class, religion and food as cinematic language, she traced every choice back to lived experience, actor workshops, and real locations that lent truth to her frame.

Dr. Bijukumar shared how Papa Buka arose from his Papua New Guinea visit, threading Indian soldiers' forgotten histories into broader indigenous narratives. International voices also included Pablo Larraín, Anna Christina and Anuparna Roy, each reflecting on global reception and the universality of cinema.














## KSFDC's **Dynamic** Partnership with IFFK

### **Bridging Borders Through Cinema:** Kerala Film Market





## Honouring a Cinematic Maverick

he Ritwik Ghatak Centenaru Celebrations Exhibition was inaugurated at the Tagore Theatre as part of the 30th International Film Festival of Kerala, offering audiences a rare and evocative insight into the life and oeuvre of one of Indian cinema's most radical and visionaru filmmakers. Organised in collaboration with the West Bengal Department of Information and Cultural Affairs, the exhibition brings together an extensive collection of photographs, film stills, posters, and personal artefacts, collectively tracing the remarkable trajectory of Ghatak's cinematic journey.

Veteran filmmaker Gautam Ghose formally inaugurated the exhibition, following a welcome address by Kerala State Chalachitra Academy Secretary C. Ajoy, who highlighted the festival's pride in marking Ghatak's birth centenary alongside special screenings of his restored masterpieces, including Meghe Dhaka Tara, Komal Gandhar, Subarnarekha, and Titash Ekti Nadir

In his inaugural remarks, Ghose described himself candidly as a "mad fan" of Ghatak and reflected on the exceptional depth and rarity of the filmmaker's writings, many of which remain difficult to access despite his prodigious output. He traced Ghatak's artistic journey from theatre to cinema, lauding his steadfast refusal to adhere to conventional film grammar and his uncompromising belief in cinema as a direct and powerful medium of communication. Ghose also invoked the

enduring urgency and contemporary relevance of Ghatak's vision, calling upon future generations to engage with his work in a sustained and meaningful manner

The occasion further marked the release of a new book, *Kathiyeriyunna Lokam: Ritwik Ghatakinte Cinemayum Kaalavum* written by C.S Venkiteswaran, brought out by the Kerala State Chalachitra Academy. The book was released by Gautam Ghose and formally received by film editor Bina Paul. Kerala Cultural Workers Welfare Fund Board Chairperson Madhupal was also present. Film critic C. S Venkiteswaran observed that the coming century would truly belong to Ritwik Ghatak, underscoring the lasting resonance and significance of his cinema. •
